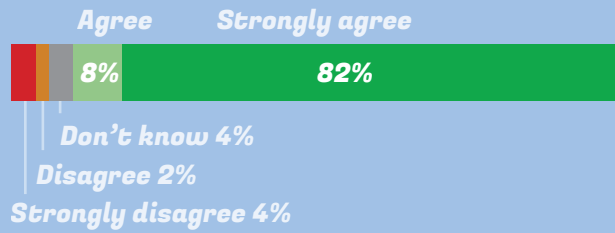


On the road and smoke-free

The large majority of New Zealanders believe smoking and vaping should be banned in cars carrying children

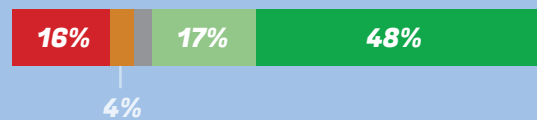
A majority (90%) agreed that **smoking should be banned in cars carrying children**. Six percent did not agree, while four percent were undecided.

All respondents



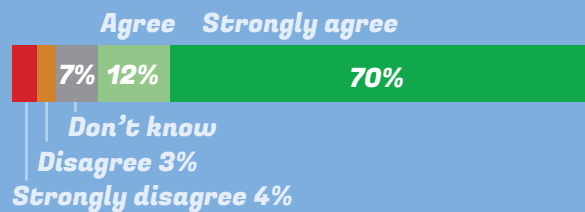
The largest statistically significant difference in opinion occurred with respondents who smoked at least once a day, where 65% agreed that **smoking should be banned**, and 20% disagreed.

Respondents who smoke at least once per day



A majority (82%) agreed that **vaping should be banned in cars carrying children**. Seven percent did not agree, while seven percent were undecided.

Significant differences in opinion occurred with respondents who were regular (daily, weekly or monthly) vaping users, with just 42%, 46% and 55% respectively agreeing that **vaping should be banned in cars carrying children**.

We polled n = 1220 people through a Research New Zealand online panel, between 3-17 March 2019. The maximum margin of error is +/- 3.8% (at the 95 percent confidence level).



7.4% of the sample were smokers, and 2.9% were vaping users.
